Dr. Herbert Ho Ping Kong

MBBS PhD FRCPC Professor of Medicine, University of Toronto



Education, Practice and Philanthropy

As Dr. Ho Ping Kong completes his eleven year tenure as Gladstone and Maisie Chang Chair in Teaching of Internal Medicine at the University of Toronto, he will explore the impact that philanthropy can have on the advancement of clinical practice and medical education.

He will discuss successful developments in Internal Medicine subspecialty training for physicians in developing countries as well as the establishment of The HoPingKong Centre. The Centre is dedicated to furthering the development of scholarly educational innovations and clinical practice in Internal Medicine. It has a particular emphasis on developing the next generation of clinician educators in Internal Medicine. He will also demonstrate the importance of humane medicine: the value of the creation and nurturing of the doctor-patient relationship through empathy, compassion, advocacy, and listening. Lastly, Dr Ho Ping Kong will convey the many ways that the Gladstone and Maisie Chang Chair enriched his career allowing him to support his patients, his colleagues, and contribute to the training of future physicians.

About Dr. Herbert Ho Ping Kong

Dr. Ho Ping Kong was previously Chairman of the Specialty Committee in Internal Medicine at the Royal College of Physicians of Canada, as well as the former Associate Physician-in-Chief of the Toronto Hospital.

Dr. Ho Ping Kong is a graduate of St. George's College in Kingston, Jamaica, and the University of the West Indies (1965). He immigrated to Canada in the early 1970s to join McGill University and became the Founder and First Director of the Division of General Internal Medicine at the Royal Victoria Hospital in 1981. He is co-founder of The HoPingKong Centre for Excellence in Education and Practice (CEEP) at the University Health Network, and recently completed an eleven-year tenure as Gladstone and Maisie Chang Chair in Teaching of Internal Medicine at the University of Toronto. He has been recognized with numerous awards over the span of his career including the 3M National Teaching Fellowship from the Society for Teaching and Learning in Higher Education in 1999, and the Canadian Society of Internal Medicine Osler Award in 2003.

3M NATIONAL TEACHING FELLOWSHIP

Established in 1986, the 3M National Teaching Fellowship is sponsored jointly by 3M Canada and the Society for Teaching and Learning in Higher Education (STLHE). The Fellowship is the only pan-Canadian, cross-disciplinary recognition of educational leadership and excellence in university teaching. The Fellowship recognizes teachers who have demonstrated leadership in enhancing postsecondary teaching excellence locally, nationally, and often internationally, and superlative undergraduate teaching, sustained over several years.

Martin Schreiber MD MMedEd FRCPC Department of Medicine, Division of Nephrology

Dr. Schreiber is a full professor in the Department of Medicine at the University of Toronto, and staff physician in the Division of Nephrology at St. Michael's Hospital. After completing both his MD and residency training in Internal Medicine at the University of Toronto, he joined the Faculty as a lecturer in 1994. In 1996, he completed a Master of Medical Education degree at the University of Dundee. In 2001, he was promoted to Associate Professor, and in 2010, he achieved the rank of full Professor

For over 15 years, Dr. Schreiber has been actively involved in educational leadership. In 2000, he assumed the roles of Course Director for Foundations of Medical Practice (an undergraduate second-year course within the MD program) and Deputy Director for the Fitzgerald Academy. He also served as Director of Undergraduate Education from 2002 to 2005, and Preclerkship Director from 2005 to 2013. Since 2013, he has served as the Chair of the Teaching Effectiveness Committee for the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Toronto, and since 2012, he has held the position of Director, Undergraduate Medical Education Curriculum for the Faculty of Medicine. Dr. Schreiber has also held the position of Interim Review Coordinator for LCME/CACMS Accreditation since 2010, and from 2014 to 2015, he served as Interim Course Director for the Transition to Clerkship program.

Dr. Schreiber has been formally recognized for his teaching excellence with nearly 40 teaching awards. He has received two W. T. Aikins Awards, for Excellence in Individual Teaching Performance (1998) and Course/Program Development and Coordination (2004), as well as the President's Teaching Award. He received the Ontario Confederation of University Faculty Associations' (OCUFA) Teaching Award, the Ontario Medical Association's Advocate for Students Award, and the Dean A. L. Chute (Silver Shovel) Award nine times. He has also been accepted into the University of Toronto Teaching Academy.

UNDERGRADUATE MEDICAL EDUCATION AWARDS

W. T. Aikins Awards

These awards, named after William Thomas Aikins, the first Dean of the Faculty of Medicine following the 1887 reorganization, are the Faculty's most prestigious awards in Undergraduate Medical Education. They were established to recognize and formally reward outstanding teachers in the areas of Individual Teaching Performance (Small and Large Group), Development and Use of Innovative Instructional Methods, and Course / Program Development and Coordination. Recipients of these awards have significantly contributed to high-quality undergraduate teaching by establishing and integrating new and effective methods of instruction into the undergraduate curriculum.

This year, we recognize excellence in two categories: Course / Program Development and Coordination and Individual Teaching Performance (Small Group).

W. T. Aikins Award - Course / Program Development and Coordination

Pamela Coates MD

Department of Paediatrics

Dr. Coates is a paediatrician at Trillium Health Partners and an Assistant Professor of Paediatrics in the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Toronto. Dr. Coates graduated with a medical degree from McGill University and went on to practice emergency and general paediatrics at Montreal Children's Hospital. In 1984, Dr. Coates joined the paediatric department at Mississauga Hospital and in 1985 she became a founding member of the paediatric department at The Credit Valley Hospital. In 1996, Dr. Coates was appointed Chief of Paediatrics, as well as Medical Director of the hospital's paediatric program.

Since 2007, she has served as the inaugural Director of the Mississauga Academy of Medicine (MAM), which was launched the following year with a small number of activities in a variety of courses, and came to full fruition with a cohort of 54 students in 2011-2012, who graduated in spring of 2015. Before the launch of MAM, well below 40% of the physicians across Trillium Health Partners' legacy sites had faculty appointment status. In a short period of time, this number has increased to over 73% of physicians, many of whom have won awards for excellence in teaching.

W. T. Aikins Award – Individual Teaching Performance (Small Group)

Carol Heck MSc PhD

Department of Physical Therapy

Dr. Heck received her PhD and MSc in Anatomy from McGill and her BScPT from University of Alberta. She has held faculty positions at McMaster, University of Western Ontario and since 1995, as an Assistant Professor, Department of Physical Therapy, University of Toronto. For the past 10 years, she has also been a laboratory demonstrator in Structure and Function for first year medical students at University of Toronto. In 2012-2013, she received the Mississauga Academy of Medicine Award for Excellence in Small Group Teaching. Carol also works at University Health Network as part of a core research leadership group to support and maintain a vision of enabling excellence in academic practice and family-centred care. Outside of her work she takes great pride in the accomplishments of her husband lain and children, Alistair, Paisley, and Kenzie, all of whom are future health professionals.

Reflection

"The mediocre teacher tells. The good teacher explains. The superior teacher demonstrates. The great teacher inspires" (William Arthur Ward). More than just transmitting knowledge, I believe teaching is about inspiring students to learn through discovery, challenging assumptions, questioning, and engaging in critical thinking. To do these things effectively, I believe a teacher has to be engaged with students, and students must be engaged with their learning. My favourite type of teaching involves experiential and applied learning; therefore interacting with students in an anatomy dissection lab is ideally suited to my interests and strengths as an educator.

MEDICAL ALUMNI ASSOCIATION AWARDS

Dr. E. Mary Hollington Teaching Awards

In 1980, Dr. E. Mary Hollington, a British citizen and 1944 graduate of the Faculty of Medicine, retired from active practice in the British Isles. In gratitude for the financial and academic support she received from the Faculty throughout her difficult years in Canada during World War II, she made a gift of £5,000 to the Medical Alumni Association. The Executive of the Association elected to use the interest on this invested capital to establish two awards recognizing excellence in undergraduate medical education: the Dr. E. Mary Hollington Excellence in Pre-Clinical or Basic Science Teaching Award, in recognition of demonstrated excellence in pre-clinical or basic science teaching, and the Dr. E. Mary Hollington Excellence in Clinical Teaching Award, in recognition of demonstrated excellence in clinical teaching.

Dean A. L. Chute Award (The Silver Shovel)

The Silver Shovel Award was instituted by the graduating class of 1954. It was re-instituted by the Medical Alumni Association in 1973 and re-named in honour of Dean A. L. Chute. The award recognizes an undergraduate teacher who is deemed to have demonstrated excellence in overall clinical teaching in the undergraduate medical program.

Class of 8T9 Medical Alumni Award

The Class of 1989 established the Class of 8T9 Medical Alumni Award to recognize faculty members for their outstanding contribution to the undergraduate experience.

EXCELLENCE IN COMMUNITY-BASED TEACHING AWARDS

Established by the Faculty of Medicine in 2012 these awards recognize the significant contribution of an increasing number of University of Toronto community-based teachers to the learning of medical students and residents. The first award recognizes excellence in community-based clinical teaching in a community hospital, the second award recognizes excellence in community-based clinical teaching in a clinic or office setting, and the third award recognizes sustained excellence in community-based clinical teaching.

Excellence in Community-Based Teaching -Community Hospital

Nina Horvath MD CCFP FCFP

Department of Family & Community Medicine

Dr. Horvath graduated from the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Toronto in 1972. Following a two year Family Medicine Residency Program at the University of Toronto, she obtained her Certification in the College of Family Physicians in 1976. For the next 24 years she had a very rewarding career in general and academic Family Medicine, including work in Emergency, Rehabilitation and Geriatrics with a major teaching commitment. In 1994 she completed training in Palliative Medicine through the Ontario Ministry of Health Palliative Care Initiative. Dr. Horvath began practicing Palliative Care full time after joining the staff of the Temmy Latner Centre for Palliative Care at Mount Sinai Hospital in 1998. In 2008, Dr. Horvath became the medical director of The Freeman Centre for the Advancement of Palliative Care at the North York General Hospital. Dr. Horvath's passion is to provide the best care for her patients and to teach Palliative Care to improve and disseminate its provision. Her special interest area is the incorporation of Narrative Medicine into teaching methods.

Reflection

Excellence in Community-Based Teaching - Clinic/ Office/Practice

Rosa Braga-Mele MD MEd FRCSC

Department of Ophthalmology

Dr. Braga-Mele graduated Magna Cum Laude from University of Ottawa Medical School and completed her residency at the University of Toronto. She completed her Master's Degree in Higher Education with areas of specialty in curriculum development and patient-physician communication skills. She is the Director of Professionalism and Bio-Medical Ethics for the Dept. of Ophthalmology. She was the inaugural Research Director at the Kensington Eye Institute in Toronto, and was appointed as Cataract Director in 2013. She is involved in the resident surgical teaching curriculum development and implementation. She has won multiple awards both at the undergraduate and resident levels for her teaching and mentorship abilities. She has been recognized with the American Academy of Ophthalmology (AAO) Achievement Award (2007), the AAO Secretariat Award (2012) and the AAO Senior Achievement Award (2013).

Reflection

I have a passion for teaching both in the clinic but mainly in the operating room. It has truly been a gift. Some days are challenging and stressful and sometimes make you wonder...Why do I do this? But then you see the accomplishments of the learners, the happiness of figuring it out. It makes it all worthwhile. For every surgery I do, I help that one patient. But for every resident I teach and make confident, I am helping so many more patients. AND, I learn every day I am with a resident, specifically in the OR.

Excellence in Community-Based Teaching – Sustained Excellence

Jeffrey Weissberger MD CCFP FCFP

Department of Family & Community Medicine

After graduating University of Toronto Meds 9T8, Dr. Weissberger completed his Family Medicine residency at Queen's University (1998-2000). Since then, he has been practicing comprehensive family medicine, including intrapartum obstetrics at Markham Stouffville Hospital. He has been active in teaching at the undergraduate and postgraduate level since 2000. Since 2008, he has hosted an ASCM group in Markham, bringing pre-clerkship teaching to Markham Stouffville Hospital. None of this would be possible without the support of his wife Laya and his children Evan, Aaron, and Amy.

Reflection

I have been blessed to have had the opportunity to work with so many wonderful students over the last 15+ years. I treat learners as future colleagues and peers - I think this is why my teaching is so well received. I recall the many great teachers I had, most notably Dr. Steven Shumak, who I try to emulate. I am truly humbled to receive this honour.

UNDERGRADUATE TEACHING AWARDS IN LIFE SCIENCES

The Faculty of Medicine, in partnership with the Basic Sciences Departments and Divisions within the Faculty, offers three annual Undergraduate Teaching Awards in Life Sciences.

Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching in Life Sciences

This award recognizes sustained excellence in teaching, coordination and/or development of an undergraduate lecture or seminar course in Arts and Science offered by the Basic Sciences Departments of the Faculty of Medicine.

Excellence in Undergraduate Laboratory Teaching in Life Sciences

This award recognizes sustained excellence in the teaching, coordination and/or development of laboratory based instruction, either in a formal Arts and Science laboratory course, or as a mentor for students in an undergraduate research project course, offered by the Basic Sciences Departments of the Faculty of Medicine.

Excellence in Linking Undergraduate Teaching to Research in Life Sciences

This award recognizes sustained excellence in integrating research in undergraduate teaching in Arts and Science within the Basic Science Departments of the Faculty of Medicine.

Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching in Life Sciences

Cindi Morshead PhD

Department of Surgery

Dr. Morshead completed her PhD at the University of Toronto and joined the faculty in 2003. She is currently a tenured Professor and Chair of the Division of Anatomy, Department of Surgery, appointed to the Institute of Biomaterial and Biomedical Engineering and the Rehabilitation Science Institute. She is also the Graduate Coordinator in the Institute of Medical Science. Dr. Morshead's expertise is in stem cell biology and specifically in the field of adult neural stem cells. Her work is funded by CIHR, Heart and Stroke Foundation, Canadian Partnership in Stroke Recovery, Network for Centres of Excellence, Krembil Foundation, Brain Canada, Ontario Institute of Regenerative Medicine and the Ontario Brain Institute.

Reflection

Many students take my neuroanatomy class primarily to satisfy a requirement for their programs so it is gratifying to me that by the end of the course, many ask if there is a way for them to continue in the next term. Any successes I have had with students are in large part the outcome of working with outstanding teachers that I have tried my best to emulate. Ahlia Khan-Trottier PhD

Department of Biochemistry

Dr. Khan-Trottier is proudly "home grown", earning both a BSc and PhD in the Department of Biochemistry at the University of Toronto. She began teaching as a graduate student and joined the faculty in 2006. She is now an Associate Professor, Teaching Stream, responsible for the development, teaching and coordination of all of the undergraduate laboratory courses in the Department. Dr. Khan-Trottier is continually modifying and evolving her courses to improve student learning, introduce new experimental methods and foster development of competent and skillful graduates.

Reflection

Excellence in Linking Undergraduate Teaching to Research in Life Sciences

Jagdish Butany MBBS MS FRCPC

Department of Laboratory Medicine and Pathology

Following medical training in India, Dr. Butany qualified as a pathologist (Toronto, FRCPC 1979) and followed this with a year at the NIH (NHLBI - Pathology). He is currently Professor and Director of Anatomical Pathology at University of Toronto, and Staff Pathologist and Consultant Cardiovascular Pathologist at the Toronto General Hospital. He has had a career-long interest in teaching and CME, where he was awarded the Toronto General Hospital's WA Anderson Teaching Award ('94-'95), the Aikins Award (1995), the LMP Department's John B Walter Teaching Award (2002), and the Colin R. Woolf Award (2012). A founding member of the Society for Cardiovascular Pathology (Distinguished Achievement Award, he was its President ('07 - '09) and was Co-Editor-in-Chief of Cardiovascular Pathology, with Dr Avrum Gotlieb.

Reflection

Teaching is a pleasure & rewarding, but not easy! I've at times wished the ground would open up -- and others when the day ended too soon! On weekends others choose between reading, going out, spending time with family, one wonders can I ? -I still have to prep a lecture! To teach well takes time, thought, effort, and luck! Excellence in Linking Undergraduate Teaching to Research in Life Sciences

Martin Wojtowicz PhD

Department of Physiology

Dr. Wojtowicz studied at Dalhousie University (BSc) and the University of Ottawa (PhD). He obtained postdoctoral training at the University of California and Toronto Western Research Institute, joining the Department of Physiology at the University of Toronto in 1987 as an Assistant Professor, and progressing through the ranks to Full Professor in 2002 and Professor Emeritus in 2016. He served as a graduate coordinator in Physiology for seven years during 2009-2015, teaching and directing several undergraduate and graduate courses, most recently, Advanced Laboratory Physiology, PSL 374, and Hippocampus From Cells to Behaviour, PSL 1050. He has conducted a laboratory research program in neuroscience specializing in synaptic plasticity and hippocampal adult neurogenesis and gained a leadership position for his fundamental discoveries of the functional roles of new-born neurons in learning and memory.

Reflection

As a faculty member, I have been privileged to be involved in advanced medical research and have tried to convey some of the enthusiasm for fundamental research to my students. Although not many of them will follow scientific careers, the principles of hard work, dedication and team effort will benefit them in their chosen professions. The most rewarding aspect of this process is to observe how my former students thrive in their own careers.

GRADUATE FACULTY TEACHING AWARDS

Early Career Excellence in Graduate Teaching and Mentorship

This award recognizes contributions to the training and experience of graduate students by faculty members within five years of their academic appointment. These contributions are evidenced by excellence in teaching, supervision or mentorship, and dedication to students.

Continuing Excellence in Graduate Teaching and Mentorship

This award was established in 2002 to recognize sustained contribution to graduate student mentorship exemplified by, but not limited to: major involvement in graduate student learning, enthusiastic and empathic critical appraisal of students' work, timely assessment of students' research programs including program advisory committee meetings and prompt turnaround of written work, and careful attention to a critical path laid out for students' research.

Sustained Excellence in Graduate Teaching and Mentorship

The Sustained Excellence in Graduate Teaching award was established in 2002 in an effort to recognize sustained contribution to any aspect of graduate teaching including a course, curriculum development, graduate program administration, graduate student supervision or academic role modeling, for more than five years.

Early Career Excellence in Graduate Teaching and Mentorship

Paul Boutros PhD

Department of Medical Biophysics

Dr. Boutros pursued his undergraduate education at the University of Waterloo and his PhD at the University of Toronto. In 2008, Paul started his independent research career with an appointment at the Ontario Institute for Cancer Research. He is now a Principal Investigator in Informatics & Biocomputing at OICR, and an Assistant Professor in the Departments of Pharmacology & Toxicology and Medical Biophysics at the University of Toronto. His research focuses on personalizing therapy for prostate cancer by developing novel statistical methodologies. He leads the bioinformatics analysis of the sequencing of 500 prostate cancers as part of the Canadian Prostate Cancer Genome Network, and is using these data to develop prostate cancer biomarkers. He also leads the ICGC-TCGA DREAM Somatic Mutation Calling Challenge to set global standards for analyzing cancer genomic data.

Reflection

The mentoring of graduate students is a sacred trust. At the dawn of their careers, our students privilege us to guide them on a journey of self-discovery: of what it is like to do transformational research, of what kind of career they want to build, and of what type of person they want to be. Nothing brings me greater happiness as a scientist, than seeing them succeed. It brings me great joy to know that the vigor and insight of my students will keep the light of research shining light at high-noon as my own career moves towards its dusk.

Early Career Excellence in Graduate Teaching and Mentorship

Brian Cox PhD

Department of Physiology

Dr. Cox completed his MSc in Biochemistry at the University of Guelph and his PhD in Molecular Genetics at the University of Toronto. He is currently Assistant Professor in the Department of Physiology.

Dr. Cox heads the Cox Systems Biology Lab in the Department of Physiology. He has trained across multiple disciplines including biochemistry, environmental chemistry, toxicology, developmental biology and bioinformatics. As well, he spent several years in the bio-tech sector working on antimicrobial drug development.

In addition to his many teaching commitments, he also devised and developed PSL1040H Systems Biology in Physiology. He was also recognized with the Robert Goode Early Career Teaching Award from the Department of Physiology last year.

Continuing Excellence in Graduate Teaching and Mentorship

Jennifer Gommerman PhD

Department of Immunology

Dr. Gommerman has been working as a faculty member in the Department of Immunology at UofT since 2003. In this capacity, she established and mentored a team of talented trainees from the undergraduate to the graduate and postdoctoral level. Students who have graduated from the lab (5 PhDs) have gone on to further post-doctoral training in well-recognized international laboratories. Her students, who have published in high profile journals, have also won a number of prestigious awards both as graduate students and later as post-doctoral fellows. In 2014, Dr. Gommerman assumed the role of Graduate Coordinator and in this role she spearheaded a new Applied MSc program in Immunology. In her capacity as Graduate Coordinator, she continues to seek mechanisms to improve the graduate student experience and to enhance learning and career outcomes for the students in the Department.

Reflection

As a mentor for graduate students, my ultimate goal is to communicate scientific knowledge in a manner that is inspiring, and to encourage students to think critically. Seldom is there a one-size-fits-all mechanism for meeting these objectives, which makes my job challenging. However the reward is worth the effort: the most satisfying outcome being the privilege to observe, in a longitudinal manner, a student's maturation process in action.

Continuing Excellence in Graduate Teaching and Mentorship

Anthony Hanley PhD

Department of Nutritional Sciences

Dr. Hanley received his PhD in epidemiology from the University of Toronto in 2000, and was subsequently a postdoctoral fellow in the Division of Clinical Epidemiology, University of Texas Health Sciences Centre at San Antonio. From 2002-2005 he was a research scientist in the Leadership Sinai Centre for Diabetes at Mount Sinai Hospital and an Assistant Professor in the Departments of Medicine and Public Health Sciences at the University of Toronto. Since 2005, he has been a faculty member in the Department of Nutritional Sciences where he teaches, conducts research. and supervises graduate students. Dr. Hanley is currently an Associate Professor and holds a Tier II Canada Research Chair in Diabetes Epidemiology. He is also the Graduate Coordinator (Admissions and Awards) for the Department and has also served on over 30 graduate advisory committees.

Reflection

My graduate students are my top priority and I spend many hours per week in one-on-one meetings to provide guidance and mentoring and to review progress. I endeavor to expose my graduate students to the full spectrum of the research process, including the conceptualization of research questions, preparation of grant applications, data collection, analysis, as well as manuscript preparation, submission and revision. My goal in graduate supervision is for my trainees to emerge from their program fully prepared for the next stage of their academic lives (further training or independent positions) through the experience of being fully immersed in the research process.

Sustained Excellence in Graduate Teaching and Mentorship

Dina Brooks PhD PT

Department of Physical Therapy

Dr. Brooks is a clinician-scientist whose research crosses boundaries between the study of basic mechanistic issues in rehabilitation in respiratory disease, development of clinical trials to quantify the effect of pulmonary and cardiovascular rehabilitation, and knowledge translation through establishment of clinical practice guidelines. In 2008, she received the Canadian Physiotherapy Association Mentorship Award in recognition of her inspiration to colleagues through acting as a role model for professionalism and volunteerism. That these qualities extend to her teaching of graduate students is evidenced by her receiving the Department of Physical Therapy's Recognition in Teaching Award for 8 consecutive years and 3 Rising Star Awards for teaching and education in addition to the W.T. Aikins Award bestowed for individual teaching performance.

Sustained Excellence in Graduate Teaching and Mentorship

Patricia Brubaker PhD

Department of Physiology

Dr. Brubaker obtained her PhD at McGill University followed by post-doctoral studies at the University of Toronto, where she is now a Professor in the Departments of Physiology and Medicine at the University of Toronto. Since 1985, she has been actively involved in studies on the intestinal glucagonlike peptides, GLP-1 and GLP-2. GLP-1 therapy is currently used to lower alycemia in patients with type 2 diabetes. Dr. Brubaker's studies focus on the regulation of secretion of GLP-1 as a possible new therapeutic approach for these patients. Dr. Brubaker was also one of the original discoverers of the intestinotrophic actions of GLP-2, and a GLP-2 analog has very recently been approved to treat patients with short bowel syndrome. Her current studies on GLP-2 are related to the mechanism of action of this intestinal growth hormone. Dr. Brubaker has received several awards for her research, including the Canadian Diabetes Association Young Scientist Award (1998) and a Tier 1 Canada Research Chair in Vascular and Metabolic Biology (2000; renewed 2007, 2015).

Reflection

Sustained Excellence in Graduate Teaching and Mentorship

Reinhart Reithmeier PhD

Department of Biochemistry

Dr. Reithmeier obtained his BSc at Carleton University in 1972 and his PhD in Biochemistry at the University of British Columbia in 1977. Following post-doctoral training at Harvard and the University of Toronto, he obtained his first faculty position at the University of Alberta in 1980. Dr. Reithmeier is currently Professor of Biochemistry, and the creator of both the Biochemistry Research Day (2004) and the Benjamin Schachter Alumni Lecture, as Chair of the Department of Biochemistry from 2002–2013. Dr. Reithmeier has served as the Graduate Coordinator in both the Department of Biochemistry (1993-1995) and the Institute of Medical Sciences (IMS) (1999-2001). At the IMS, he was instrumental in the raising of admission standards and formalization of procedures and was part of the School of Graduate Studies (SGS) Executive. Dr. Reithmeier is known internationally for his research on anion transport membrane proteins in human health and disease. An award-winning lecturer, Dr. Reithmeier enjoys teaching introductory biochemistry to 1,000 undergraduate students every year, as well as upper level and graduate courses. Most recently, he was appointed Special Advisor to the Dean of SGS for Graduate Professional Development (GPD) and Engagement, where he has created the first GPD course in Life Sciences.

AWARDS FOR EXCELLENCE IN POSTGRADUATE MEDICAL EDUCATION

Excellence in Postgraduate Medical Education Award - Development and Innovation

This award was introduced in 2003 and serves to recognize outstanding contributions of faculty members in program development, administration and innovation in postgraduate medical education.

Excellence in Postgraduate Medical Education Award - Teaching Performance, Mentorship and Advocacy

This award, also established in 2003, recognizes outstanding contributions of faculty members who demonstrate excellence in teaching and serve as mentors and advocates to postgraduate medical trainees. The award may acknowledge continuous or long- term excellence in instruction, career counseling, promotion of collegiality, or role modeling for postgraduate trainees.

Charles Mickle Fellowship

The Charles Mickle Fellowship is awarded annually to a member of the medical profession anywhere in the world who has "done the most within the preceding 10 years to advance and promote sound knowledge of a practical kind in the medical art or science by careful and thorough work."

Social Responsibility Award in Postgraduate Medical Education

The Social Responsibility Awards recognize the outstanding contributions of faculty members and residents in the development and/or implementation of socially responsible initiatives, programs or research related to postgraduate medical education. Postgraduate medical education lays the groundwork of experience, attitudes, ethics and responsibility prior to independent practice. As such, it is vital that learners are exposed to health service, health status and health determinant disparities and understand their responsibility in ensuring equitable access to healthcare and facilitating the highest health status possible for individuals and communities in Ontario, Canada and globally. The purpose of the award is to emphasize the importance of social responsibility to postgraduate training and to acknowledge the leadership of specific individuals in helping Postgraduate Medical Education (PGME) meet its social accountability mandate.

The Sarita Verma Award for Advocacy and Mentorship in Postgraduate Medicine

The Sarita Verma Award for Advocacy and Mentorship in Postgraduate Medicine was established in 2010 at the end of Dr. Verma's term as Vice Dean, Postgraduate Medical Education (PGME), in recognition of her exceptional contributions to postgraduate medical education in Ontario. The award recognizes staff or faculty members who exhibit an exemplary level of leadership and commitment to social responsibility, mentorship, advocacy, and resident wellbeing.

Excellence in Postgraduate Medical Education Award - Development and Innovation

Christopher Hicks MD MEd FRCPC

Department of Medicine, Division of Emergency Medicine

Dr. Hicks is an emergency physician and trauma team leader at St. Michael's Hospital, as well as a Clinician-Educator in the Department of Medicine. Team-based skills are not innate, but rather need to be developed by way of deliberate practice in order to turn a team of experts into an expert team. Dr. Hicks' program of research focuses on novel ways to improve team performance during critical events in emergency medicine and trauma. His team's current work involves human factors engineers to help examine the nature of team- and task-based processes in trauma resuscitation, scrutinizing team-based non-technical skills and design ergonomics to improve care for critically injured patients. He uses high fidelity human patient simulation to help make teams work better and more safely.

Scott Berry MD MHSc FRCPC

Dr. Berry is a medical oncologist at the Sunnybrook Odette Cancer Centre and an Associate Professor in the Faculty of Medicine. Dr. Berry loves teaching and has received the Division of Medical Oncology Teaching Award twelve times as well as the Divisional Education Award. Formerly the Deputy Dean of the Faculty of Medicine, Associate Vice-Provost, Health Professions Education and Vice-Dean PGME, Dr. Verma is the 2006 recipient of the Donald Richards Wilson Award in medical education from the RCPSC and the 2009 co-recipient of the May Cohen Gender Equity Award from the AFMC. She was a lead consultant for the Future of Medical Education in Canada Postgraduate project. CONTINUING PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT AWARDS

Colin R. Woolf Awards

The Colin R. Woolf Awards were created to recognize outstanding contributions to continuing education courses. The first award is given to a University of Toronto-sponsored course for Excellence in Course Coordination. The second award is given for Excellence in Teaching, sustained over a five year period, in a University of Toronto- sponsored Continuing Education course. The final category recognizes Long-Term Contributions, excellence sustained over at least five years, in Continuing Education activities, including course coordination, and may include an administrative or research role in Continuing Education.

David Fear Fellowship

David was an anesthetist at the Hospital for Sick Children, active in the University's Department of Anesthesia, where he served as Director of Continuing Education, and the Chair of the Faculty Council Committee on Continuing Education. Until his untimely death in June 1997, his leadership in clinical, educational and administrative roles was instrumental in raising awareness of, and competence in, continuing education. This fellowship attempts to recognize David's role in this area, and to support those faculty members who wish to develop or enhance their competence and skills in CE.

Fred Fallis Award in Distance Education

This award was named to honour Dr. Fred Fallis, the first Assistant Dean in Continuing Education in the Faculty of Medicine, University of Toronto (1982-1985) and one of the founders of Telemedicine for Ontario. The award recognizes an individual or group which has demonstrated innovation and excellence in online learning for health professionals.

Interprofessional Health Care Team Continuing Education Award

Acknowledging the importance of exceptional health care teams in the provision of quality health care, this award has been developed to recognize excellence in interprofessional team continuing education, and professional development designed to enhance interprofessional team practice, to ultimately improve health care delivery.

Ivan Silver Innovation Award

To honour Dr. Ivan Silver's distinguished contribution to the fields of CEPD, this Award is intended to recognize an innovative CEPD initiative developed and delivered by a University of Toronto faculty member or team that has demonstrated an effect on health professional performance or health outcomes.

Colin R. Woolf Award for Excellence in Course Coordination

The winners in this category are jointly recognized for their work on Rhinology Update 2015. Designed for the practicing otolaryngologist as well as fellows and residents, this iteration transformed normal didactic lectures and cadaveric dissections into a live video feed of real-time surgery demonstrations from the operating room. It included live two-way communication between operating room and participants as well as experts in the theatre fielding questions and giving instruction. The program was further augmented by in-person interactive dissection demonstrations by world-renowned guest, the pre-eminent sinus surgeon Professor Heinz Stammberger.

Yvonne Chan MD FRC(S)C MSc

Department of Otolaryngology - Head & Neck Surgery

Dr. Chan is an Assistant Professor and the Continuing Professional Development Director in the Department of Otolaryngology-Head & Neck Surgery. She finished her Otolaryngology residency training at the University of Toronto and subsequently completed a Rhinology fellowship at the Georgia Nasal and Sinus Institute. Dr. Chan obtained her medical degree and a Master's of Science degree in molecular genetics and molecular biology also from the University of Toronto. At the Mississauga Academy of Medicine, she is the undergraduate medical lead for Otolaryngology. Her Otolaryngology practice at Trillium Health Partners has a focus in advanced rhinology and endocrine surgery. Since 2015, she has been the editor of the world renowned Otolaryngology textbook, K. J. Lee's Essential Otolaryngology 11th edition.

John Lee MD FRCSC MSC

Department of Otolaryngology - Head & Neck Surgery

Dr. Lee is an Otolaryngologist-Head & Neck Surgeon and Assistant Professor in the Department of Otolaryngology-Head & Neck Surgery at the University of Toronto. He completed his residency training in Toronto before going on to do a fellowship in Endoscopic Sinus & Skull Base Surgery at the University of Pennsylvania. In 2009, Dr. Lee was recruited back to the University of Toronto based out of St. Michael's Hospital. His main clinical focus is in the field of Rhinology (Diseases of the Nose and Sinuses) as well as working with Neurosurgeons in treating tumours of the skull base. Dr. Lee holds a Master's Degree in Health Research Methodology and is also an Associate Scientist in the Keenan Research Centre of the Li Ka Shing Knowledge Institute.

In 2009, he was awarded the Gold Medal Award by the Canadian Anesthesiologists' Society, the highest personal award in recognition of his contribution to anesthesia in Canada through excellence in teaching, research, professional practice in the field of ultrasound guided regional anesthesia. In May 2013, he received the International Anesthesia Research Society Teaching Recognition Award for Achievement in Education. In October 2013, he received the Distinguished Service Award from European Society of Regional Anesthesia and Pain Therapy (Spain) for outstanding clinical, educational and scientific achievements in anesthesiology. In April 2016, he received the Gaston Labat Award from ASRA for outstanding contributions to the development, teaching and practice of regional anesthesia.

Dr. Weiss is a Paediatric Neurologist in the Department of Paediatrics at HSC (since 1998) and a Professor in the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Toronto. In addition to her interest in education, her clinical and research activities are focused in the area of epilepsy and in sleep medicine. She has developed her skills and knowledge in medical education, as a Program Director in Paediatric Neurology from interactions with many great mentors in education at HSC, and as graduate of the Education Scholarship Program, CFD. Her current leadership position in education is as the Director of Faculty Development for the Dept. of Paediatrics (2010 to present). Dr. Weiss has had a major role in developing curriculum and participating in CE events for both national and international learners in her role at HSC, as well as through her involvement with the Canadian Sleep Society, as both a current and past-President.

Reflection

My approach includes the following: a careful review of previous evaluation summaries and a needs assessment of the learners, being cognizant of your audience (number of participants, number of physicians, allied health professionals, learners etc.), working with a planning committee representing key stakeholders to develop the curriculum, and ensuring adequate interactivity. I believe that all these components are crucial to develop successful CE events that meet the needs of adult learners.

David Fear Fellowship

Rene Wong MD MEd FRCPC PhD(Candidate) Department of Medicine, Division of Endocrinology & Metabolism

Rene Wong is an endocrinologist, clinician-educator and Assistant Professor in the Department of Medicine at the University of Toronto. He holds a Master's of Medical Education degree from the University of Dundee in Scotland. He is currently lead for professional development for the Banting and Best Diabetes Centre, where initiatives have been directed towards improving diabetes care provided by different health professional groups. The TEACH Project

Peter Selby MBBS CCFP FCFP MHSc, Executive Director

Funded by the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care as part of the Smoke-Free Ontario Strategy, The Training Enhancement in Applied Cessation Counselling and Health (TEACH) Project is a knowledge translation project offering Canada's only internationally-accredited certificate program in cessation counselling. This certificate program provides the context, background and evidence-based knowledge and skills needed to offer intensive tobacco cessation counselling. In response to demand, an online version of the TEACH Core Course was developed and piloted in February 2013. Since that time, TEACH has delivered nine iterations of the online Core Course, training just over 900 healthcare practitioners.

Kazuhiro Yasufuku MD PhD

Department of Surgery

Dr. Yasufuku is an internationally known Thoracic Surgeon with specific expertise in minimally invasive thoracic surgery and minimally invasive diagnostic procedures. He was appointed Associate Professor of Surgery at University of Toronto, Division of Thoracic Surgery in 2008. He is also the Director of Endoscopy and Director of the Interventional Thoracic Surgery Program at UHN. He graduated from Chiba University School of Medicine, Japan, in 1992. He pursued his General Surgery Training and Thoracic Surgery Training at Chiba University. His clinical interests include minimally invasive diagnostic and surgery for thoracic oncology and lung transplantation. The Endobronchial Ultrasound Training Course was developed in 2008 - to meet the needs of health care professionals interested in starting the program. It is a unique course with focus on hands-on laboratory approaches combined with video recording playback analysis for the participants. It is a multi-disciplinary course featuring integration with pathologists, respirologists and nurses. In 2007, only two centres in Canada performed EBUS. Now there are over 50 centres in Canada and over 2500 centres around the world performing EBUS.
